The operation of our community has settled into a routine that has minimized the need for the regular meetings. All of our contracts are being administered by FirstService Residential, and supervised by our volunteers. Your Home Owners Association Board meets regularly with Ross Rutman, our FirstService Residential property manager to insure the Association's business is current, bills are paid, and the property is maintained. The next public meeting of the Board is scheduled for May 28th. Typically the Board does not hold public meetings during the summer vacation months. October brings our General Meeting where we will elect a new Board member.



It is important to your community that you select new Board members that reflect your ideas of what should be done in our community. The general election this October is your opportunity to affect the way your maintenance fee is spent. If there are things you want to see changed, consider submitting your name for the election. The only qualification to be a Board member is that you must be a homeowner. The solicitations for candidates will be sent out in late August or early September.

Landscaping has started with spring cleanup and mulching, with more sprucing up and seasonal plantings to continue through the season. New trees will be planted along our streets and in common areas. The required pool safety inspections are in progress to support opening on Memorial Day weekend.

Our volunteer workers are helping to keep our expenses down, because they ensure our contractors perform correctly and perform some tasks themselves. This Chant newsletter is produced by volunteers, and actually makes money for us through the advertising. Support the advertisers. Volunteers set up and return the chairs for

our meetings, program repair or replace our key fobs, make pool passes, and perform all sorts of other tasks that save us money. Have you borrowed a book from our library? Volunteers are essential to our ability to “Live the Dream at Enchantment”. The Social Committee welcomes new residents to their meetings. The meetings are a great way to meet your new neighbors and discover the activities available to you in our community.

Please volunteer your time to support one of our committees. No special commitment of time or talent is required, just a desire to get involved with your neighbors.

As Board liaison for the transition process I have arranged several meetings with officials from Hamilton Township, the Robertson Douglas Group (our builder) and our Board. We are discussing phases of our sidewalks and aprons, landscape plantings, our roadways and other minor issues. Our meetings have been cordial and we continue to meet on a regular basis in order to complete the process of transition.

Last fall we replaced some trees and shrubs and we are working with the contractor to replace the ones that didn't make it through the winter. In addition we will be replacing ones that died since the fall planting. This is an ongoing process and we will look again in the fall to see what else needs to be replaced.

If you take the time to walk around the community and see how nice it looks, it is easy forget the second consecutive brutal winter that we had. Fortunately, with the additional money allotted to snow removal in the budget, as well as the leftover money in the snow fund, we have been able to avoid an assessment at this time. We just have to be mindful that December can be nasty so we will have to wait and see what Mother Nature brings.

Overall our financial situation remains solid with adequate cash to pay our bills and fund our reserves. Last year at this time I mentioned that the board was having an engineering firm do an updated reserve study. This is done approximately every five years to insure that we are adequately funding our Replacement Reserve Account. The report indicates that we have to increase our annual contribution to properly fund the account. When we budget for next year we will have to take into account the necessary increase in funding. The board, working with the engineering firm, will try and keep the increase to a minimum and spread it over two years. We will be doing the budget for 2016 at the end of the summer and finalize it by the end of September.

The 2014 audit draft has been completed and the board will be going over the details with the auditor. It appears that the steps we took last year allowed us to finish 2014 in good shape. Once finalized, the audit will be posted on our site.

As I said at the top of the article our community looks great and we want to keep it that way. The annual Earth Day event provided an opportunity for our resident volunteers to pitch in by picking up trash around community and they did a nice job. If you're out walking and see a plastic bag or something else that might have blown out of our trash cans please pick it up and dispose of it in your trash. Ignoring it will not make it disappear. After all, this is our community and the way it looks reflects on all of us.


Pool should be opening Memorial Day week-end. A good sign that summer is beginning and the time is now to move outside for your entertainment.


Both Pickleball Ball, and Bocce have started and we look for a fun filled season.

Instructions



There are two ways the visitor gate can be opened:

A visitor can stop at the call box at the visitor entrance lane and using the “A” or “Z” buttons, locate the last name of the resident to be visited. When the name is selected, the visitor presses the “CALL” button. A phone call is placed to the resident, who can answer the phone. The visitor can converse with resident using the call box, and the resident can open the visitor gate by pressing 9 on his telephone key pad. If the resident does not want the visitor to enter, the resident can press the star button (*), or hang up and the call box will be disconnected. If residents do not have their key fob with them, residents can enter the community by using the visitor gate call box. In this instance the resident presses the pound or number key (#) on the call box followed by the last four digits of the phone number that is on record.

The gate will then open. Entering pound (#) followed by 1111 will open the gate up until 8pm.




The pool committee had its first pre-season meeting and is getting organized to gear up for another great pool season.

Report on the Enchantment Presentations Program

So far in 2015 we have had an active program of presentations, which audiences appear to have received very favorably.

On February 23rd, Enchantment Resident, Edie Glover, spoke to us about “The Benefits of Positive Communication.”

Communication is that most basic and essential of human activities that sets us apart from all other species on the planet for the range and sophistication with which we interact with one another. Edie spoke to us about the definition of communication, its benefits, as well as different modes of communication and also gave us tips on ways in which we can improve how we communicate with one another. To illustrate her points about positive communication, she got the attendees to interact with one another.

On March 25th, we enjoyed a presentation from Physical Therapist, Dr. Joseph Caruso, and Dietitian, Ms. Olivia Caruso of Caruso Physical therapy and Nutrition of Allentown, NJ, on



how diet and physical therapy can be used to treat osteoporosis. We learned from them about the balance between bone formation and bone breakdown that determines the wellbeing of our skeleton throughout life. We learned that what we did or did not do in our younger years to improve our bone health often tends to have an impact on our bone health in our later years. As we age, due to changes in our diet and physical activity and also due to hormonal changes, particularly in women, the breakdown of bone starts to outpace the formation of bone leading to an imbalance in this equilibrium. Initially, this leads to a condition of declining bone density known as osteopenia and then, later, to full blown osteoporosis, where bone fractures can occur more readily. While osteoporosis is not usually reversible, we learned how modifying our diet and increasing weight bearing exercise can help to restore a better equilibrium and slow the progress of the condition.

On April 14th, we were treated to a fascinating and informative, presentation from Dr. Edward Soffen, Radiation Oncologist, with Princeton Radiology Associates and one of the attending physicians at the ProCure Proton Therapy Center in Somerset, NJ. The latter is one of only 14 such centers in the entire United States. Dr. Soffen explained how proton radiation treatment, an advanced form of cancer therapy, can be used to effectively and beneficially treat a wide variety of solid tumors, both malignant and non-malignant. He also explained why proton radiation treatment tends to be better tolerated than more traditional forms

of radiation treatment, and often leads to better outcomes than the latter.

Looking to the future, on May 19th, we will have a presentation on Pet First Aid from Dr. Stacey Rebello, veterinarian with NorthStar Vets., veterinary emergency trauma and specialty center in Robbinsville. This should appeal to all pet owners, pet grandparents and all animal lovers, in general, residing in Enchantment. If you are in one or more of these categories, you are strongly urged to attend!

Date: First Wednesday of the Month





Hi Everyone,

Have you played racquet sports (tennis, racquetball) but just cannot get around like you used to? Do you feel the need to be active? Then Pickleball might be for you. We started it here last spring. Just like it is taking off in senior communities around the country, it has taken off here. Last season we had 40 different residents try it. Your neighbors played over 3,600 games. For some it is addictive.



Rather than explain here what Pickleball is, Google “what is Pickleball”.
